 - Aquila KIDS strings (recommended)
 - Leather Picks (recommended)
 - Straps available (and strap buttons)
 - Labels
 - Storage

What is Needed for Ukulele (continued):

- Tools (recommended)
 - Jowoom Smart Tuner T2 (also: Roadie and Enya)
 - String Winder/Clipper
 - Work Mat & Head Rest (e.g. Music Nomad)
 - Music Nomad Octopus Tool
 - 10mm Open End Wrench
 - Clip On Tuner (TC Electronics)
 - String Action Gauge
 - Laminate Ukulele Needs:
 - Sanding Sponge
 - 0000 Steel Wool
 - Fretboard Lemon Oil or Music Nomad F One
 - Titebond Original
 - JB Weld (Plastic Ukuleles)
 - Elmer's School Glue (Nuts)
- Skills
 - Changing strings (tie bar, slotted, pull through)
 - Dealing with sharp fret ends
 - How to adjust action (0.5mm @ 1st fret, generally 2.65mm @12th fret)
 - Cleaning (microfiber cloth)
 - String change maintenance (fretboard, frets, and bridge)
 - Be ahead of your students.

 - Chordette (Font: UkeFarm)
 - Assistive Devices
 - High G, Low G, Campanella
 - Strumming
 - Where to strum
 - How to strum
 - Strumming patterns
 - Play the right chord at the right time

What is Needed for Ukulele (continued):

- Resources (continued)
 - The tricky "G" Chord
 - Plant 2
 - Stress the frequent use of the chord
 - "Gateway" to harder chords
 - Left Handed Students
 - Right handed
 - Left handed
 - Right handed played left
 - Barre Chords
 - Pull, don't pitch
 - Start at the 5th Fret
 - Which Chords?
 - One finger? (C, Am, F9, C7)
 - Key of C? (C, F, G7, Am(
 - Frequency of Use?
 - My Solution: Modified Frequency of Use
 - C, F, G, G7, Am, D, Em, etc.

Teaching Ukulele

- Assign ukuleles to specific students
- Teach tuning, but do not allow K-8 to tune
- Noodling: know your level of tolerance
- Some students will only play Am7 (C6). They are still playing and participating
- Keep it fun
- Cater to the interests and musical tastes of your students, as well as their purposes for learning the instrument!
- If I were teaching music theory, I would teach harmonic analysis via ukulele
- Teach about the history of the instrument
- Teach the parts of the ukulele
- Make or find a rubric
 - Chords
 - Rhythm
 - Posture
 - Participation
 - Composition
 - Content
 - History of the Ukulele
 - Parts of the Ukulele
 - Expectations
 - Identifying Chords
 - Use AI to make rubrics!

Dr. Russell's Practices

- Assessments are in two areas
 - Performance: Use Skill Drills and let students choose level/score
 - Composition: Make a song or tutorial showing how to play the chords in a song, then play that song
 - Use of Video (Canva)
